WORLD FRIENDSHIP DAY AND THE FUTURE OF HIGHER EDUCATION

FSFBA's annual celebration of World Friendship Day always calls up memories of the many cultures that Friendship Force has befriended. At this year's celebration—on Sunday, March 10th, at the Los Altos Library—President Don Pelland reviewed some of our club's many exchanges, past and future, and showed FFI's video about the Legacy Fund. The current goal of the fund is to establish 45 new clubs throughout the world, to spread the benefits of cultural exchange and friendship, especially in developing countries. The other major theme of the day was the future of higher education.

We had the unique opportunity to hear from Mohammad H. Qayoumi, President of San Jose State University, who spoke on "Higher Education at a Crossroads." One of the current innovations in higher education is MOOCS—Massively Open Online Courses. Besides helping to reduce costs for both the school system and students, at an average tuition of \$150 per course, the online programs can enroll more students than the traditional classroom programs. The pilot programs at SJSU will begin with a small number of students assigned to mentors to ensure success in the courses. Listening to President Qayoumi, one can have no doubt that San Jose State University is a leading academic institution in the Bay Area, graduating more students who move on to successful careers in Silicon Valley than any other university.

A native of Kabul, Afghanistan, who has also worked as financial advisor to the current Afghan leadership, President Qayoumi graciously answered questions about the state of his native land and his outlook for its future. —*Karen L. McCready*

EXTENDING OUR CULTURAL BRIDGE WITH INDONESIA

Through Friendship Force International's interaction with other international organizations, sometimes we get the opportunity to develop more international friendships right here at home. The Institute of International Education contacted our club recently to offer such an occasion. On Friday, March 29, Martha LeRoy, RoseMarie Everett, Barry Rader, and I went to San Francisco to meet with two educators from Indonesia. They had requested a meeting with some of our members for the sake of developing a relationship with our club and perhaps promoting a teacher exchange. They are in the States for several weeks as part of the International Visitor Leadership Program, run through the State Department, which provides them with an escort to visit schools in different regions of the country.

We were welcomed into the institute's top floor office on Sutter Street. We marveled at the view from the balcony-the St. Francis Hotel elevators going up and down. Our meeting in the conference room quickly settled into a warm exchange about their culture, their educational system, and their impressions of the United States. Ms. Desi Kurniawati, as chair of a Jakarta State School's cultural affairs program, develops cross-cultural exchange and outreach programs for high school students throughout Indonesia and in the United States. Ms. Stella Prancisca is director of American Corner, which partners with the American Embassy to introduce American values, society, and culture through English learning-related programs. She oversees 38 study programs through the university. On this, her first, trip to the United States, she hopes to gain firsthand knowledge for her cultural programs. Ms. Kurniawati, on the other hand, has visited many states during several years of arranging two-way exchanges between our countries.

Some insights that we gained about Indonesia are that about ten percent of their 240 million people live below the poverty line and that their literacy level, while probably not particularly low, is difficult to measure in lightly populated areas. Among their diverse ethnic groups, spread through many islands, some cannibals remain (in Papua). Trying to interest us in organizing an eco-exchange, they described their climate as "not too humid," under 30 degrees Celsius until July. It's all relative! English is compulsory, starting in first grade now. The structure of the Indonesian language, similar to English, makes their learning easier. Asked about the Dutch and Islamic influences on their culture, they said that Dutch law prevails in all facets of life except banking and marriage, for which Sharia law applies.

The two women's chief impressions of America are that the people are warm (like Indonesians!), that our food is mildly flavored and very healthy, that many are active in sports, and that the universities are very open. They had seen women wearing the traditional Islamic hijab, just as they do.

We exchanged some small gifts and left with the impression of two thoroughly professional, gifted, and articulate representatives of the Indonesian education system, as fluent in English as we. At least one of us wants to look into the eco-exchange programs that FFI would help to coordinate. These programs may involve releasing turtles, snorkeling on a coral reef, and planting coral and mangrove trees to rebuild reefs damaged by dynamiting for fish. This sounds like a way to attract younger members to Friendship Force. No, we would not go after July. —*Karen L. McCready*

DISCOVERY TRIP TO MYANMAR (BURMA)

I couldn't believe my eyes when I scanned through the Friendship Force catalog last year and saw that the Northern Colorado club was planning a visit to Myanmar from February 16 through March 1, 2013. I immediately emailed the Exchange Director, Dot Cada, and intimated that I was really interested in the trip. On hearing this, my daughter, her husband and their daughter also wanted to join the group.

It has taken me 60 years to eventually visit Rangoon, where I was born. In 1953 my family immigrated to England, and even though I still have relatives in Burma, I never had the opportunity to visit. Burma has been under a military dictatorship for 50 years and it's only been two years since the Nobel Peace Prize winner and Democracy Leader Aung San Suu Kyi was released from house arrest. Since then it seems that the floodgates were swung wide open and foreigners have flocked there by the coach load. In Rangoon, we saw coaches filled with French, English, German, Spanish and Italian tourists and also many Chinese and other Asian travelers.

There were 23 people in our Friendship Force group. We had an Indian doctor and his wife, a couple of ladies from Canada, a couple from Richmond, a couple of ladies from Hawaii, and the rest from Colorado and California, including four members of my family.

On this trip, I experienced first-hand Friendship Force at work. There were two women in the group that I had met before, at the International Conference in Washington, D.C. in Oct. 2010. One was Mavis Grant, originally from England and now living in Canada, and Linda Edwards, whose home I actually visited in Richmond, Virginia.

Our ED had visited Myanmar before and this was her fifth trip there. The purpose of this visit was to take the opportunity to talk again with her contacts about Friendship Force Int'l, in the hope of establishing a club there in the future. This was also a humanitarian trip, as we took medical and school supplies for the many orphanages and monasteries we visited.

Burma is the land of golden pagodas and we saw many of them in the towns and villages, where time has stood still for the past 50 years. There are many artisans there, but most of their work is still done by hand, like weaving on handlooms, lacquer-ware, silver and gold jewelry, pottery, cheroot making, etc. Rangoon, the old capital, is a bustling metropolis, and the streets are totally congested with many cars and taxis. There's a lot of new construction of apartment buildings and hotels.

We visited many interesting places on our tour. One that stands out is our day on Inle Lake. This place is so picturesque that our group must have taken hundreds of photos.

The lake is huge and is surrounded by rolling hills dotted with villages. We saw the many floating gardens on which the locals plant tomatoes and vegetables. Also the rituals of everyday life are carried out on the banks of the lake. This is the only place in the world where the fishermen row their small boats with one leg. We had a delicious lunch with a local government minister and his family. We even saw the famous Padaung (or giraffe neck women), with many brass rings to elongate their necks.

We then took a short plane ride from Mandalay to Bagan. This is a stunning archeological zone covered with thousands of pagodas from the 11th, 12th & 13th centuries. Half of the group opted for a hot air balloon ride over Bagan. What a trip! The view from above was spectacular.

Shopping at the famous Scott Market in Rangoon was great. You could get literally everything at this market and the prices were very reasonable. The dollar went a long way, as the exchange was 850 kyats to one dollar. You had a wad of money when you changed \$100. The food was also very tasty and healthy. Burmese people eat a lot of vegetables. Our whole trip was absolutely awesome. No one in the group had any complaints. We stayed in very nice Western-style hotels. Kudos goes to the tour guide in Rangoon who did such a good job of organizing the tour.

Finally, I want to mention that the Burmese are a very gracious, happy and smiling people, in spite of what they've been through. I enjoyed speaking the language again.
