The Journey of South Asians to Silicon Valley

A few years ago, I read in our Fremont paper, The Argus, that one-fifth of our local population is of Indian extraction. That proportion may be more or less for the Bay Area in general. For years, I had been aware of the number of doctors and people in other professions and, of course, Silicon Valley tech employees who come from "the subcontinent." When I met a woman recently who was raised in Malaysia, I began to realize how far and wide the Indian diaspora had spread across the world. Although on the surface the immigrants raised in different world regions seem to share many traditions and family values, I became interested in exploring their individual stories of why they came to America, what traditions they brought with them, and the challenges they have faced here. I have assembled a panel from a variety of backgrounds and professions. These are some of the topics they will explore.

# THIS YEAR'S KICK OFF EVENT—WORLD FRIENDSHIP DAY, FEBRUARY 27, 2016

World Friendship Day began after the death of FFI's founder, Wayne Smith, and is held on or near March 1<sup>st</sup>, the anniversary of the founding of FFI in 1977. Our club carries on the tradition of honoring his memory with a yearly retrospective on the past year's events and a forecast of the adventures to come. Think of it as a yearly rebirth. Undoubtedly, judging from this year's program, FFSFBA is a vital organization with a wealth of activities going on.

Our World Friendship Day on Saturday, February 27<sup>th</sup>, at the Los Altos Library, proved that, with several participants reporting on travels, hosting, cultural programs, and social events. Ambassadors described their enhanced understanding of the civil rights era from home stays in Huntsville, AL and Memphis, TN in April/May and recalled adventures in Costa Rica in November 2015. Ten of our members will visit Brazil in June, with home stays in Sao Paulo and Curitiba. An energetic committee is putting together plans for a groundbreaking language immersion program for ambassadors from Sapporo, Japan in October.

Our calendar is filling up with at least one social activity every month, including Guess Who's Coming to Dinner, monthly Let's Eat Out gatherings at ethnic restaurants, group outings to little theater productions, field trips to Rosie the Riveter National Park in Richmond and Guide Dogs for the Blind in San Rafael. The Fifth @ 5:00 Meetup Group, which was started last year, is thriving with almost monthly happy-hour socials around the bay. We introduced the Cultural Book Group, featuring books about Japan, and "Where Do You Want to Go?" a group to find travel partners and choose Friendship Force locations to visit together. At future meetings, you can sign up for any or all of these offerings.

Special honored guests, the Co-Regional Field Representatives for Friendship Force International, Marty McKnew and Pat Ghiglieri, both past presidents of the Sacramento Club, gave presentations about the goals of Friendship Force and its current status. They even joined us for lunch later.

Speaking of lunch, 32 of the 40+ attending the meeting moved on down San Antonio Road to Estrellita's Mexican Restaurant for individually freshly prepared meals. The staff deserves huge accolades for preparing and serving a large variety of their delicious food. Both the food and the charming decor are inspired by the Chiapas region of Mexico, famous for its special moles (sauces) and for celebration of Dia de los Muertos, although they turn out perfectly tasty usual fare, such as burritos, too.
