EXCHANGE TO AUSTRALIA WAS WONDERFUL!

N ine ambassadors left the Bay Area on July 21st with a destination of Sydney, Australia (where we arrived on the 23rd of July). Because there was an insufficient number of people to qualify for group travel, seven traveled via United Airlines with two arriving via Qantas Airlines.

All of us stayed at the same hotel in Sydney, providing time to get acquainted and participate in some group activities. It was raining in Sydney, but no one complained. They have been in a drought condition, which required water restrictions. Having been through a similar situation, we welcomed the rain along with the Australians. The group activities included a harbor cruise with a seafood luncheon, followed by a tour of the famous Sydney Opera House in the afternoon. Our hotel was located in the district known as the Rocks, Sydney's first village and colonial port.

Sunday, July 25th, found us at the airport for our flight across the continent of Australia to the western most city of Perth. The world's most isolated capitol city, Perth is capitol of Western Australia, the largest state in Australia. It extends over a third of the continent's land mass. The majority of the 1.8 million people live around the coast or the hinterland, with about two-thirds of the population living in Perth and its environs. The Swan River runs through the city, and the vistas from Kings Park are breathtaking. The lifestyle is friendly, easy-going, and the locals are eager to share their city with their visitors. Our remaining two ambassadors, Linda Sekiguchi and Bruce Mitchener, from the Reno/Tahoe Club, joined us on Monday, July 26th for the exchange in Perth. Linda was attending an international conference in Perth the second week; therefore, they did not join us for the exchange in Melbourne.

Activities in Perth included a bus tour of the city and environs, and a visit to the Mint, where we witnessed a gold pour.

Another day's outing included a day in the Australian bush at the home of one of their members who had planned and built (with the expertise of a young Danish architect) a totally passive solar house. We learned a lot about conservation of our natural resources during our week in Perth—it was winter with cold weather! We learned that one can live without such luxuries as central heat and clothes dryers. The port city of Fremantle was established by Capt. Charles Fremantle in 1829, where the first group of convict laborers was brought to work on constructing roads and buildings in 1850. Of great interest is a war memorial located on a hill in the city—the people are still grateful to the United States for providing protection during World War II.

Katharine Kleinke brought away from Perth a certificate that she had rung the Swan Bells at the Bell Tower. In 1988, to mark Australia's Bicentenary, the well-known church of St. Martin-inthe-Fields in London donated its famous bells to Western Australia. The 18 bells are rung for an hour at noon every day, and can be heard throughout the city. Two of our ambassadors were guests at a "football" game, courtesy of our exchange director in Perth.

Sunday, August 1st, found us again at the airport to bid farewell to our hosts in Perth, and begin our second exchange, in Melbourne. We were met at the airport by our hosts and hustled off to a friendly Welcome Party in the home of one of the members.

On our first day in Melbourne, Victoria, some of us were treated to a visit to historic Williamstown and Hobsons Bay. Lunch companions were the black swans! The second day was a trip to Phillip Island with morning tea with the pelicans; then on to the Koala Conservation Centre and the Penguin Reserve after lunch. We experienced rain showers off and on, but that did not dampen our adventurous spirits. Those of us who experienced feeding the birds at the Dandenong's had a special treat. The cockatiels left their mark when they landed on your arms! We were escorted as a group by three of our day hosts on a downtown Melbourne tour. The visit to Federation Square, a most unusual collection of buildings, and the elevating experience of the observation tower in the Rialto building were memories to be cherished. Our last day of touring as a group included a day trip to Mornington Peninsula. Morning tea at Arthur's Seat vista point and lunch in Sorrento were highlights of our day.

Bidding our hosts goodbye, we all made our way to Alice Springs, either by plane or the Ghan train from Adelaide. Included in our venture to the Outback was a tour of the Royal Flying Doctors facility in Alice Springs and the School of the Air (for all the school children living in the remote regions of the outback); Ayers Rock at sunrise and sunset; the Olgas; and dinner in the desert. To complete our Australian adventure, the ladies went to Cairns in Queensland for a day on the Great Barrier Reef and a day in the rainforest with a skyrail ride in gondolas over the forest to a small village filled with Aboriginal art stores. Back in Sydney our last night, we reflected that we DID IT ALL in 27 days!!

Food for thought: We requested this exchange to Perth in 2003 when our annual requests were submitted. Out of our total membership, 6 members supported the exchange. One ambassador of this exchange is a member of the Willamette FF in Oregon; two ambassadors were from the Reno/Tahoe FF club; and two ambassadors were totally new to the organization, having been recruited for this exchange. At the same time the request for Perth was made, an outbound to China was requested (and granted), but this one had to be cancelled for lack of interest. We have now requested an exchange to Kenya for 2005, and our request has been granted. Will we support it? —*Colleen Scott*, Exchange Director



AREA 9 & 10 JOIN FORCES FOR FRIENDSHIP


