Don't Miss the Journey to Oklahoma City and Denver, September 24–October 7, 2017.

Like all of America's metropolitan centers, the hub cities of Oklahoma City and Denver have much to offer, especially to give us a different perspective from our West Coast lifestyles.

ROSIE THE RIVETER MUSEUM, MARCH 17, 2017

Join us for a very exciting day! We are taking our 15 visiting Memphis, Tennessee, Friendship Force Ambassadors to the Rosie the Riveter Museum in Richmond, by public transit. RoseMarie Everett will be writing the itinerary for this fabulous day together. We'll go rain or shine.

Rosie the Riveter Museum is an amazing place, high lighting the participation of women as they joined the workplace for the first time in large numbers. Hear the amazing stories of how it felt for these women to help build ships for the USA in 1942–45. See and hear the stories of actual women who came here from many parts of the US to join in the war effort.

I will take you to an amazing outdoor display that is the length of a liberty ship, marked with quotes from numerous women who worked these yards. It is an incredibly moving experience for both men and women to walk along the enormous ship and hear the stories.

Several real Rosie's that actually worked at the Richmond shipping yard will talk to us in the afternoon. They are 90–95 years of age and still going strong. They will tell their own stories and show their pictures from those times. The whole experience is great at the Rosie the Riveter Museum.

Our trip will start at the Fremont BART Station at 8:30am. We will not return until about 4:30pm. BART will be paying for our BART fare and our Subway lunch! We must pay a small amount for our short bus ride. If you're 65+, I can get you your own discounted Clipper Card to use on future outings, if you don't already have one. Let me know in advance.
