PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Thank you and congratulations to our new Executive Committee for 2014. At our annual meeting on September 14th in Redwood City, Martha LeRoy was elected President and Nancy Menz, Patricia Macholl, and Julice Winter were elected Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary respectively. That is a good combination of experience and abilities in the operations of our FFSFBA club. FFSFBA members also voted to request Costa Rica as our first choice for an outgoing exchange for 2015. At our last Board meeting it was decided to request a reciprocal exchange with the Alajuela, Costa Rica club which we hosted in 2010. Our second choice was a club in Japan.

In addition to the two votes mentioned above, we enjoyed the presentation by Patricia Snowden and Maylou Bartlett on their trip to Myanmar. Their pictures, souvenirs and talks were well received by about 40 people in attendance including at least 7 guests.

In late November our club will also have a great representation at the Friendship Force World Conference in New Orleans. At least nine of our members will attend. FFSFBA recently contributed \$1000 to the Friendship Force Legacy Fund. The money will support the Global Expansion Plan, to increase the number of FF clubs around the world. Our club will be recognized at the New Orleans conference for its contribution. Attempts are under way in our club to make an annual contribution to FFI's efforts to expand.

The year 2014 promises to have some interesting exchanges for FFSFBA. In late February Wendy Dewell will lead an exchange to Australia and Tasmania. There are places available on the exchange, so contact Wendy immediately if you are interested. In June we will sponsor a Themed Exchange on the gold and silver rushes in California and Nevada. The Napa, Sacramento and Reno clubs will also participate in hosting this exchange. RoseMarie Everett has taken over from me the ED responsibilities for the FFSFBA portion of the exchange. Finally, in September we will be hosting the FF club from Biarritz, France. They hosted our club in 2011 with a terrific exchange. Karen Rice, who went to Biarritz with our club, will be the ED for this exchange and is already working on a program. Contact Karen if you are willing to help and/or participate.

DID WE PROVE THAT "CA-NADIANS ARE NOT JUST LIKE US"?

Canada was the starring feature at our meeting on August ro at the Milpitas Library. The building itself, a masterful architectural blend of the historic Milpitas Elementary School with library wings added on both ends, certainly was the costar. We met in the restored auditorium with its proscenium stage and elegant trim. As the title expresses, the program was designed to prepare us for the visit of members from the Manitoba Club in Winnipeg arriving on September 26. A Power-Point slide show, presented by Karen and Barry, directed us through Canada's unique history, heavily influenced by the early fur trade, their own gold rush, and interventions from Britain, France, and the U. S. The combination of territories and provinces that exists today reflects the multicultural elements of the Inuit, First Nations, Metis, and French populations, all carefully protected and supported by the government.

The lifestyle of Canadians, all living north of the 49th parallel, includes much emphasis on winter sports and the outdoors in general. Surveys show that the vast majority of Canadians, while recognizing their strong economic ties with the U.S., want to stress the characteristics that distinguish them from the U.S.

The program posed some "hot topics" that might arise in our conversations with the visitors. For example, why were the Canadian provinces fearful of being overtaken by the U. S.? What are the distinctions among the multicultural groups mentioned above?

After the meeting, several members continued the discussion over dinner at the Macaroni Grill in nearby McCarthy Ranch. —*Karen McCready*

May 18—Horowhenua, New Zealand visit: The dedication of the New Zealand 'Ruby Glow' Tea Tree brought forth our special patroness Water Sprite for the first time. Nancialka (aka Nancy Menz) frolicked down the Forest path bearing her magical Watering Can. She asked each New Zealand ambassador to bestow a bit of water on their special tree and encouraged them to return often.

October 2—Manitoba, Canada visit: Martha LeRoy introduced the Water Sprite's entrance by reading her tale from an oversized story book. The federal work stoppage prevented Nancialka from coming, so her cousin, Forestalka (aka Karen McCready), subbed as best she could to direct the watering of the Deodar Cedar for Manitoba.

Recent improvements:

Members who had not visited the Forest for some time were impressed with the handsome new plaques, the number of flourishing trees, and the generally spruced up appearance of the place. Dave Gustavson's Brazilian hardwood plaques are beginning to attract attention from other Prusch Park groups whose signs have been vandalized. Yahoo employees deserve high praise for coming out on a work day and toiling happily for 6 hours to spread 18,000 square feet of clean mulch around the entire Forest. Our waste company donated the mulch.

Hats off to our irrigation angels:

Twenty-one trees remain of the twenty-eight planted since 1994. Nine of those trees owe their survival to a few club members and friends who take turns watering the newer trees that are not on the underground watering system. Karen and David Rice are the only club members besides myself who volunteer for this, and they do at least half of the watering. Saaku Saar, son-in-law of Howard Craven, who founded the Forest, waters at least once a month. Wes Howard, a trainer for the San Jose Sharks, helps us occasionally because of memorial trees planted for his grandparents in that area. With yours truly tied up from a knee injury for at least 6 more weeks, we could use more help.

Next tree planting:

In honor of the Biarritz, France club coming in September 2014, we will plant a Wilsonii olive tree on Friday, November 15. The Our City Forest crew will purchase, deliver, and plant the tree for us while we just supervise and enjoy a beautiful new specimen tree in our Forest. Feel free to come along!

DISCOVER NORWAY 2013 PROGRAM IN PALO ALTO

At our October 20th meeting, we Bay Area ambassadors from the August "Discover Norway" Exchange tried to do justice to a country of gracious people, colorful history, and breathtaking scenery. An added attraction was the venue, the Palo Alto Lawn Bowls Club, in a Palo Alto park adjacent to Elizabeth Gamble Garden on Embarcadero Road. While a few of the Bowls Club members quietly plied their game on the carefully manicured outside green, we enjoyed the cozy ambiance of their open-raftered clubhouse and indulged ourselves on traditional Norwegian foods furnished by Julice Winter and Gloria and Ron Greenwald.

A PowerPoint program presented by Karen and Barry, "Fjords, Folkways, and Friends of Norway," introduced the twenty ambassadors—one from Tasmania, five from South Africa, eight from our club, and six from other U.S. clubs. The slide show followed their itinerary from Oslo to a six-day home stay in Bergen with club members and then on to the Sognefjord via the Flam Railway, to Sogndal, Lillehammer, and then back to Oslo for their separate departures home or on to further travels.

Speaking on the highlights of their trip, the Greenwalds spoke of the exceptional friendliness and inclusiveness of the people; Julice, of the active children; Pat Macholl, of her delight in the new friendships and caring hosting of her first Page 4 Friendship Force exchange; Barry Rader, of the excellent and thrifty (free!) hospital care he received; and Karen McCready, of the remarkable group of ambassadors who met as strangers in Oslo and became a harmonious team. AUSTRALIA EXCHANGE—FILLING UP

Our club's only outbound exchange next year is a 3 week trip to Australia, with 2 one-week-long homestays with the Hobart Club in Tasmania (known for its scenic beauty and history), and with the Murray Bridge Club in South Australia (known as the bread basket of Australia, including wine). We will also spend 4 nights in Sydney and 3 nights in Melbourne.

NOW is the time to express your interest and send in your application to our FFSFBA exchange to Australia Feb 20–Mar 15, 2014!!

It is open to our club members, and as of Oct 20th has been opened to other FF Club members. As of October 27, we currently have 11 committed ambassadors, 7 from our club and 4 from other clubs. The host clubs can accept a maximum of 16.

To apply, you need to fill out an ambassador application (on-line at FFI), and send a check to FFSFBA for \$25, which is non-refundable if you are accepted. Acceptance criteria are: I) that you be a "good" ambassador, 2) you are mobile, 3) you can carry your own suitcase, and 4) that you want to participate in the activities the host clubs will have planned for us.

Im most thankful for my planning committee who attended numerous meetings to organize this exchange. We are very grateful to the 11 home hosts and 8 day hosts who made it possible for 17 Canadians to participate in a great exchange with our FF Club.

According to the Canadians' evaluations, they enjoyed mingling and meeting many new friends from our club at the Welcome Reception at the Olive Hyde Art Gallery. Food & beverages were served on the patio and in the Mission Room while listening to guitarist Carl Tichen, who contributed to the ambiance on the plaza as he sang songs familiar to both Canadians and us.

The Hayward Culture Day was a full one. This included a tour of All Saints Catholic Church, coordinated by Joe & Marty Fraga. Steve Mullin, lay pastor of the church, gave an outstanding tour describing the architecture of the classic California and Spanish design of the 100-year-old church.

Our next stop was a visit to the Hayward Senior Center and the David Morrisson Theatre, followed by the Japanese Gardens. Lunch provided a wide variety of Asian food at the Koyko Buffet.

The Mural tour was informative and enjoyable, but too long for some. It was especially interesting to have two artists describe their subjects and research in preparation of their paintings, as well as the challenges in painting on different wall surfaces.

The first day in San Francisco was sunny and clear! I was successful in getting all 25 of us on the same Powell & Hyde Cable Car! Although very crowded, it was exciting to see the sights of the various neighborhoods as the cable car wound through the streets and hills.

After touring the San Francisco Maritime Museums (terrific views of the Bay that day), we ate lunch at Fisherman's Wharf. Then 32 of us rode the "Duck" while touring land and bay on a WWII-style amphibious truck/boat vehicle. Everyone used their duck calls to startle tourists below. A few people had a chance to 'drive' the "boat" when we were in the water behind McCovey Cove.

Sunday & Monday were free days, so the hosts took their Ambassadors to view new sights all over the Bay Area. Potlucks added enjoyment on each side of the Bay.

On Tuesday, Oct. 1, our first stop was at the Palace Hotel, built during the end of the 19th century. At Pier 33, Alcatraz Terminal, we were met with initial disappointment with the closing of our Federal Government. This caused our tour of Alcatraz Island to be cancelled, much to our dismay. However, Alcatraz Cruises instead took us on a 75-minute tour of the Bay on their beautiful new three-story hybrid boat! Everyone loved the Bay cruise around Golden Gate Bridge & Alcatraz Island. While dining at Neptune Palace on Pier 39, we enjoyed lovely views of the Bay.

Our last day of touring was spent at Prusch Park in San Jose. Our Ambassadors were touched by our Water Sprite (a.k.a. Karen McCready) ceremony, which allowed each Canadian to water their tree in the Friendship Forest, in honor of their club's exchange with our club.

While touring the Winchester Mystery House, we learned about Sarah Winchester, who was the only heir to the famous Winchester Rifle fortune of the 1880's. The House has a unique design of windows and doors, with the number 13 being significant in every room.

The Farewell lunch followed in the private Winchester Room. Stan Croall, ED from Manitoba, shared his photos from the week's exchange. We presented our club pins to the Ambassadors, as well as their picture with their host on a Hayward mural card.

The final farewells were said at San Francisco Airport the following day. We were sad to see our new FF friends depart, but wished them Bon Voyage, hoping to see them all again one day. *—RoseMarie Everett*, Exchange Director


