#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

R ecently our club participated in two important events. First of all, our club can take great pride in a very successful exchange with the Alajuela, Costa Rica club in June. About half of our club members participated with home hosting, day hosting, helping with various tours of San Francisco, the winery tour and lunch in Livermore, potlucks and the Welcome Party and our Farewell Party at Prusch Park. Congratulations to Lois Smallwood and her committee for all the hard work that went into that exchange. From the positive responses I have heard from various members, I believe that we made many new friends from that delightful country in Central America.

Another noteworthy event was the orientation meeting at Karen McCready and Barry Rader's home on August 22<sup>nd</sup>. Many board members attended that function and shared the history and experiences they've had on various trips with several new and prospective members at the meeting.

A topic that came up at the orientation meeting was the language barrier that we sometimes experience on our exchanges. Martha LeRoy, who homehosted for the first time during the Alajuela exchange, expressed her misgivings when she first thought about trying to communicate in her minimal Spanish. But this didn't turn out to be huge problem. She had delightful guests who were eager to share their experiences. Although there was somewhat of a language barrier, it didn't prevent them from creating strong friendships.

At the board meeting which followed, Karen McCready described her work in sorting and organizing the club's archives. She created several binders that summarize the club's exchanges, going back to the first incoming exchange from Seoul, Korea in 1984, and the first outbound exchange of 40 ambassadors, led by our club's founder Gerry Earnest to New Plymouth, New Zealand in 1985, and exchanges continuing up to the present. These collections of photographs, exchange booklets, and newspaper articles contain a wealth of information, which we hope to display at future meetings, in order to bring back fond memories for long-time members, and to share the history with new members.

I recently picked up a book at Leigh's Bookstore in Sunnyvale called *In the Land of Invented Languages* by Arika Okrent. According to Ms. Okrent, there have been attempts to create at least 500 invented languages going as far back as Hildegard von Bingen in 1150 and including the Star Trek language Klingon invented in 1984. The most prominent of these has been Esperanto, devised by L. L. Zamenhof back in the 1880s in what was then Russian Poland. Zamenhof had a worthy goal. He felt that the multiplicity of languages at that time was a hindrance to world peace and understanding, so he invented a completely logical language that he and his followers hoped would become a second language for everyone throughout the world, not intending to replace the national languages. For several years after he published the language, there was a flurry of activity and several conferences centered around Esperanto. Oddly enough William Shatner in 1966 starred in the movie *Incubus* that was spoken entirely in Esperanto.

At one point I actually learned the language through a correspondence course and in the early 1990s wrote to a few people in my limited Esperanto, and made a few pen pal friends. But that was way before the Internet and email, so communications to places like Russia, for instance, took weeks. Another drawback, of course, was that there was no "Esperantoland" to visit. Although the "culture" of Esperanto includes novels, poetry, and even a translation of the Bible, it is a culture that is almost entirely invented.

Zamenhof's idealism is to be admired, but I think our Friendship Force programs are more productive. Languages are a barrier, but not an insurmountable one. Although a universal language might come in handy, with all the positive experiences many of us have had traveling, it is clearly not absolutely necessary for creating genuine friendships. —*Stephen Smallwood*, President

#### SPRING 2011 IN FRANCE AND SPAIN




